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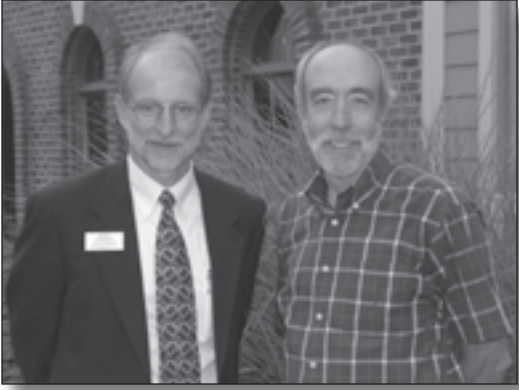

LETTER FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT AND THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

2008 Annual Report



Dear Free Clinic friends,

The Harrisonburg Rockingham Free Clinic had an eventful year:

- Started the Monday morning clinic in March to serve client acute healthcare needs.
- Launched the Harrisonburg Rockingham Dental Clinic, a new non-profit provider, in July to provide affordable dental care for eligible patients.
- Transitioned in Executive leadership as Rich Sider resigned in September and Keith Gnagey accepted the position in November.
- Developed a therapeutic lifestyle change program for patients with chronic health outcomes that pose a difficult challenge.
- Launched "Sponsor a Patient" Program. This program is designed to increase community awareness and to provide on-going operational support as donors pledge \$50 or more per month.

The Free Clinic served 1,100 residents of the community in 2008. Free Clinic and the Free Clinic Network of local partners provided over 3.5 million dollars worth of medical services. The number of Free Clinic patients grew by 10%. During 2008 the number of Free Clinic Volunteers increased from 223 to 291, a 30% increase.

We are blessed to receive skills from talented and committed volunteers we cannot afford to hire, to receive donations of needed medical equipment, and finally to receive generous financial donations toward the ongoing operational costs.

The increase in demand for our services in 2008 resulted in a deficit for the year. The Free Clinic was fortunate to have accumulated a reserve in which we were able to draw upon to cover the shortfall. However, like any business, we cannot continue to operate at a deficit. While we are projecting another deficit for 2009 due to the economy, we are hoping through grants and the donations of our generous supporters to reduce the deficit to a minimal amount.

We appreciate the many new and on-going partners who help the Free Clinic to provide health safety net services to members of the community who are unable to afford health insurance. Thanks for your support in 2008.

Project Motivate

Project Motivate was developed to better serve Free Clinic patients with chronic diseases for whom adherence with medication regimes and other aspects of their care was difficult. Non-adherent behavior can have many different causes. Thus, the goals of the program were to improve patient health outcomes and increase the effectiveness of services provided by identifying barriers to successful self care, developing strategies to overcome these barriers, and developing a mentor program.

Helping people develop a sense of self-efficacy has the potential to improve many aspects of their lives, not just their health-care related behaviors.

This is well illustrated by a young man who has many health problems related to being very overweight. In conversation about this problem, the patient identified many things which contributed to his non-adherence with various parts of his program. For example, although he wanted to exercise more and knew this would help him lose weight, he did not like “exercise” and couldn’t do very much anyway. We agreed that anything was more than he was currently doing. So, we gave him a pedometer and suggested that he try to walk just a few steps more each day than the day before. We asked him to keep track each day. Within two weeks, he found that he went from not being able to walk more than a few steps to making it half-way around the block. In another week, he was making it all the way around the block. He has decided that his new goal is twice around the block each day by the end of the month. He is also now ready to look at how he can decrease his food intake in order to increase the likelihood of weight loss. He is focusing on changes he can make, important behavior changes—lifestyle changes—that make improved long-term health more likely. An ancillary benefit has been that members of his household are also making changes in their eating and exercise behaviors as well, accompanying him on his daily walks—and the patient feels tremendous and well justified pride that he has had a positive influence on his family!

Some of the patients at the Free Clinic deal with diagnosed or undiagnosed depression. Feelings of helplessness and hopelessness permeate their days, influence their actions and inactions and create the canvas on which the tapestry of their lives is woven. When we listen with great care and compassion, these people are sometimes willing and able to let us into their world; when we can see things from their point of view and truly partner with them in seeking solutions, we are better able to find a road to improved functioning. This is the goal of Project Motivate.





Volunteer Spotlight

Suzy Kanode

Suzy Kanode volunteers at the Free Clinic every Monday morning, conducting eligibility interviews and helping patients resolve the medical bills they receive for referred services. She first learned

of the Free Clinic 15 years ago when her Sunday School class at Harrisonburg Mennonite Church brought dinner to volunteers at evening clinics. About twelve years ago she and her husband, Hahns, began making financial contributions to the Harrisonburg-Rockingham Free Clinic. At the time Suzy was a home health social worker in Augusta County and saw first hand what a need there was for Free Clinics. She worked with clients who couldn't afford their medications or the necessary medical treatment and resolved to help fund services that would address these problems.

As a mother of young children, Nick age 8 and Abbie age 4, Suzy decided that she wanted to be home with her children, catching crayfish in the creek or teaching them to garden. Last Fall she realized that she also wanted to give back to the community and make a larger contribution to the Free Clinic than just her financial donations. With a bachelor's degree in

social work and years of experience in the medical field, she is ideally suited to volunteer as a social worker in eligibility. She quickly learned the intricacies of the eligibility process and potential referral sources for our patients. She is patient and compassionate as she listens to the stories clients tell her about their difficulties and successes. She now oversees social work and eligibility services when the staff social worker is away.

Suzy reports that she likes how the Free Clinic joins with patients to work at long-term solutions, such as life-style changes, enhanced employment, and greater compliance with medical plans. She also enjoys the friendly, encouraging work environment, collaborating with other volunteers who are committed to quality care. Suzy appreciates the Clinic's flexibility in working hard to provide service for all who are in need, including connecting people with alternative services if they are not eligible here. "It's important to me to do something meaningful for others," says Suzy, whose parents taught her by their example, to volunteer. "Something I've learned from our clients is that many who have lost jobs have lost so much more than a paycheck and access to health care. They've lost dignity and purpose as well and are desperate to find another job so that they can become self-sufficient again. Several have said to me, 'I never thought I would be here.' I'm so glad we can be here for them, providing critical services in at least one area of their lives."

Harrisonburg-Rockingham Free Clinic Satisfaction Survey Annual Report Article

In 2008, two hundred ninety-one (291) volunteers clocked 14,854 hours of service at HRFC. This equals over 7 full-time employees. In the same period the number of Free Clinic volunteers increased by 30%. As we recruit and train volunteers it is important to receive feedback from current volunteers regarding their experience at the Free Clinic.

A Volunteer Satisfaction Survey was conducted in early 2009. The report indicates overall volunteers have a very positive experience at the Free Clinic. The survey included questions related to the "work environment" and "relations between staff and volunteers." For example, the question "volunteers feel that they use their skills and abilities doing meaningful work" received 100% affirmation.

We are grateful for feedback related to the supervision of volunteers and other suggestions provided in open-ended questions. Surveys like this are great tools as we continually improve patient services and improve the volunteer work experience at the Free Clinic. Portrait of a Volunteer Physician

The Harrisonburg-Rockingham Free Clinic is fortunate to have skillful, dedicated nurses, physicians and other clinicians who volunteer their time and expertise in service to our patients, who otherwise would have limited or no access to healthcare services. One of these committed volunteers is Dr. Phillip Day.

Dr. Day has been practicing medicine for 25 years. He began his career in Cincinnati, Ohio, and then moved to Harrisonburg where he has remained. Dr. Day practices with Harrisonburg Internal Medicine.

Board-certified in Internal Medicine, Dr. Day provides adult health services for both acute and chronic conditions to patients at the Free Clinic. With his friendly and soft spoken manner, he is well-liked by the patients and well known and respected by his colleagues, staff and volunteers.

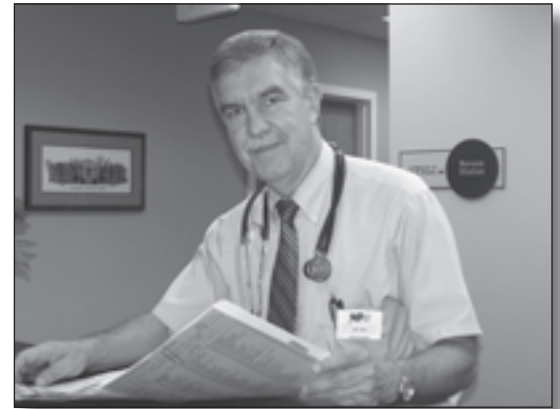
Dr. Day began volunteering at the Free Clinic shortly after it opened its doors. He recalls it being "the 2nd or 3rd clinic after it started seeing patients in the public health facility." Patients as well as staff and volunteers value this frequent and dedicated volunteer at the Free Clinic.

Dr. Day's interest in volunteering at the Free Clinic came about as a result of his personal relationships with many of the founders of the HR Free Clinic and Free Clinics throughout the state. As these relationships grew, so did his interest in volunteerism. When asked why he chose the Free Clinic over the many other worthy organizations in Harrisonburg/Rockingham county, he said, "It seemed to fit with my talents the best." Dr. Day also saw the need for patients of the Free Clinic to have not only consultations but also routine access to an entire network of healthcare to keep them healthy.

Dr. Day has always been impressed with the dedication and enthusiasm shown by Free Clinic volunteers and community members at large. He is impressed by the broad range of patients seen and served, both multi-culturally and by disease states. "The Harrisonburg-Rockingham Free Clinic does a good job with the treatment of these patients."

Dr. Day goes on to say, "The only constant in Health Care in the past 25 years has been that it changes in the care and financing of it. The clinic has adapted and expanded greatly since it opened and has added increased pharmacy hours, clinic hours, dental and specialty clinics. Although universal insurance may be planned by the current administration, I'm sure that there will be a multitude of gaps in coverage and accessibility of services that communities will need Free Clinics to fill."

Dr. Day took the time to sit down and complete this interview with me even though he had worked at his office during the day and was getting ready for an evening clinic at HRFC. He believes in the HR Free Clinic Mission and is willing to serve.



A Patient's Story

Elizabeth Grattan came to the Free Clinic in December of 2002 after working for a local organization for 26 years. Like so many others in our community, Ms. Grattan found herself in a position that she never expected to be in - unemployed and uninsured. For some, asking for help can be the largest hurdle but "When you need help you just need to ask for it. Sometimes it's hard when you've worked all your life to admit that you need help."

Ms. Grattan suffers from two chronic conditions and had been without medications for quite some time when she came to the Free Clinic. The Free Clinic was able to regulate her conditions with medications, diet, and routine follow-up visits. "If it hadn't been for you all, I would be dead. I cannot even begin to say thank you. I feel so lucky that you all cared so much about me and took such wonderful care of me." The Free Clinic was there to bridge a gap between Ms. Grattan's unemployment and beginning Medicare. She leaves the Free Clinic service with great appreciation.

Pharmacy Report

The Free Clinic organization is like a jigsaw puzzle where all of the pieces must fit together to make the whole. The first piece of the puzzle is eligibility interview conducted by our volunteers and supervised by Bernie Mathes, our staff Social Worker. The second piece of the puzzle is our volunteer and paid medical staff coordinated by Tina Latta, the Clinical Services Coordinator. The third and final piece is the pharmacy which coordinates the Medical Assistance Program (MAP) and dispenses over 200 prescriptions a day. Every piece has a role in providing a comprehensive healthcare plan for the patient.

Many changes in the community and economy have affected the Free Clinic. For example, people who have lost their employment recently under the Free Clinic's guidelines may be eligible for our services but be over income for certain drug companies in the MAP program. It is up to the team to recognize and identify these patients in order to make necessary adjustments when writing their prescriptions.

The Medical Staff is made up of a volunteer provider network who work together to form a comprehensive therapeutic plan for each patient. Each patient is evaluated upon entering the Free Clinic's care. From this evaluation the medical staff can diagnose the patient and form a treatment plan that includes diet, lab work, nurse's visits, outside referrals, and prescriptions through the pharmacy. The medical staff works hand in hand with the eligibility process and the pharmacy to coordinate the patient's healthcare. For example, the clinical staff has a copy of all of the drugs available through the MAP program. This enables the staff to select drugs from the companies that are providing these medications free of charge, thus saving money for the patient and the clinic.

The final piece of the puzzle is the pharmacy, coordinated by Leslie Mohler, staff pharmacist. The pharmacy is open Tuesday and Wednesday every week and fills approximately 200-300 requests a day. The Free Clinic pharmacy also relies on faithful volunteers like Dick Brown and Harry Reubush who process all of the medications and receive them into the pharmacy's inventory or Denise Shaw and Lynn Januszewski who serve as pharmacy techs helping to fill the prescriptions as they are received. These folks, with the help of staff, provide the continuity that makes this piece of the puzzle work. The pharmacy works with all of the staff to identify ways to help the patient. Many patients' conditions and needs change and the pharmacy staff always looks for ways to provide the medications needed for little or no cost to the patient. Under the pharmacy program, Eileen Haines, Jo Bowman and Herb Swartz work tirelessly preparing the paperwork that the drug manufactures require for each prescription. The team works to make sure that all of the prescriptions are written within the drug companies' regulations. Listed below are the seventeen drug manufactures that provide medications through a Medical Assistance Program to Free Clinic patients. In 2008, 22,163 prescriptions were filled in the Free Clinic pharmacy with a value of \$1,973,142.00.

The Free Clinic is a team that is dedicated to working with all of the pieces of the puzzle to make sure that the patient's needs are met. Sometimes we have to look for creative alternatives when situations arise that do not fit into the traditional mold, but we are willing to look at each patient as an individual. Thank you to all of the medical providers, volunteers and staff who are willing to look for just the right piece of the puzzle to make the whole.

tending a helping hand to those most in need. For all of the support that this community has given, the staff and patients of the Free Clinic say thank you.

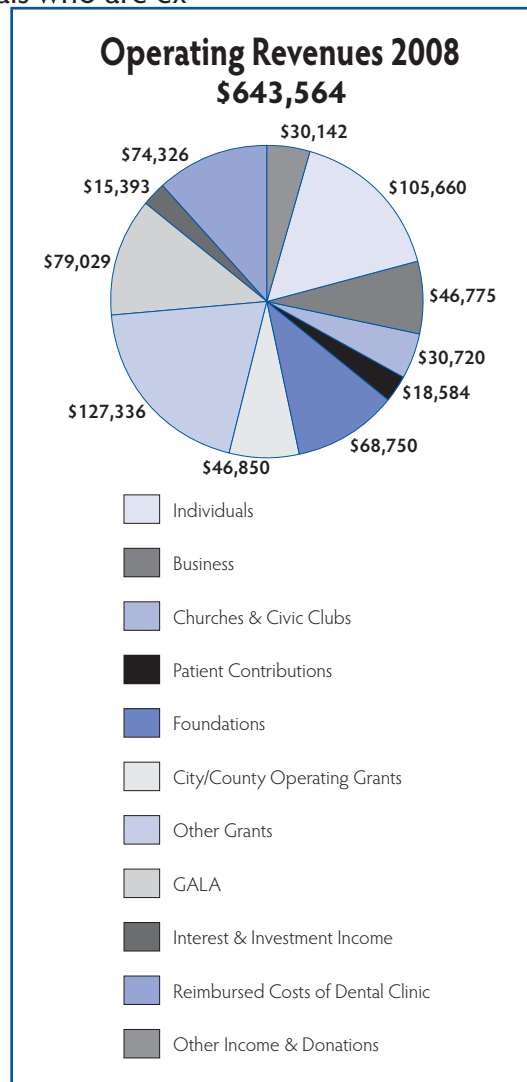
The cornerstone of the HRFC annual fundraising efforts is the holiday appeal. In addition to the holiday appeal letter, the Board of Directors launched a media campaign to increase the visibility of the Free Clinic's message. This campaign consisted of TV commercials and public service announcements used to increase awareness of the need for our services in the community. Thank you to MLC Advertising for creating a poignant ad and for Comcast, WHSV and Verstandig Broadcasting who generously became our media partners. This year's holiday appeal letter written by Board President Sandy Hodge raised \$61,958.15. The HRFC

introduced a Spring Appeal letter this year, generously written by our board member, Betty Martin. In this letter Betty told her story of how she got involved with the clinic and why she volunteers every Wednesday night for our evening clinic. With Betty's help, this letter raised \$28,890 for operating expenses.

In addition to the annual support we receive from our community the HRFC continues to seek funds through grants and foundations. We are fortunate to receive an annual grant from the Commonwealth of Virginia administered by the Virginia Association of Free Clinics. We are grateful to the City

of Harrisonburg and Rockingham County for their continued support; combined these supporters gave \$ 70,703.00. These funds have enabled the HRFC to continue to provide healthcare and pharmacy services to our patients as well as extend our clinic hours to offer a Monday morning clinic and hire a Clinical Services Director.

Fundraising events have continued to be another growing source of income for the HRFC, with the Mardi Gras Gala being our signature event. This event has raised more than \$647,000 in the fourteen years since its inception. Our Gala committee members are volunteers from our community who generously devote their time and talents to putting on a premier event. Thank you to all of the committee for your hard work,





especially Marla Nemoytin the decorations chair, Elaine Joecks the Silent Auction chair, Kate Renalds and Meredith Wells for chairing the event this year.

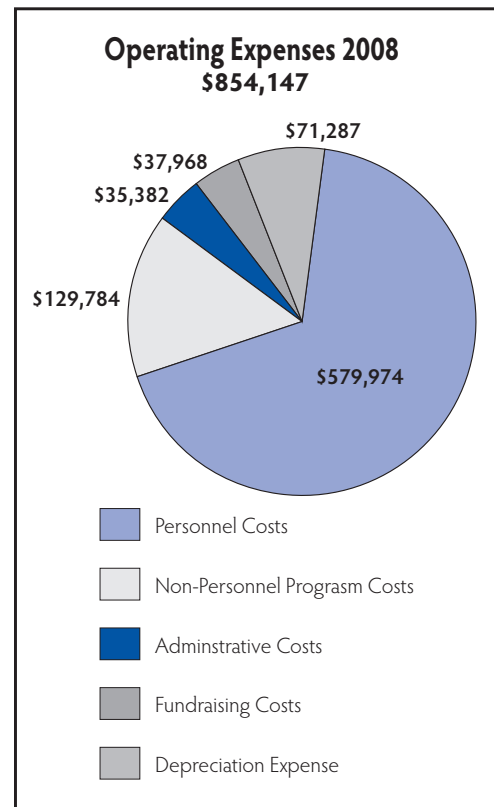


The HRFC has been blessed by the civic organizations in our community who dedicate

their event proceeds to the Free Clinic for annual support. For over 10 years the Harrisonburg-Massanutten Rotary Club has chosen the HRFC as the co-beneficiary of their annual Volleyball Springfest tournament. In 2008, the tournament raised \$6,196.90 for the Free Clinic. Thank you also to the Lions of Massanutten Foundation who raised \$4,152.45 in their annual golf tournament for the Free Clinic.

In addition to the support we receive from our donors, the HRFC could not exist without our volunteers. Thank you to everyone who volunteers at the front desk, the medical providers who give their time and talents, the dentists who dedicate

their time in the extraction clinics twice a month, the nurses who review the charts and call in the referrals, the students who pull charts and make reminder calls, the clerical staff who enter data into the database, and to all of the board members who serve on committees to provide leadership to the staff. Without you we would not be able to provide \$5.50 worth of care for every dollar that we are given.

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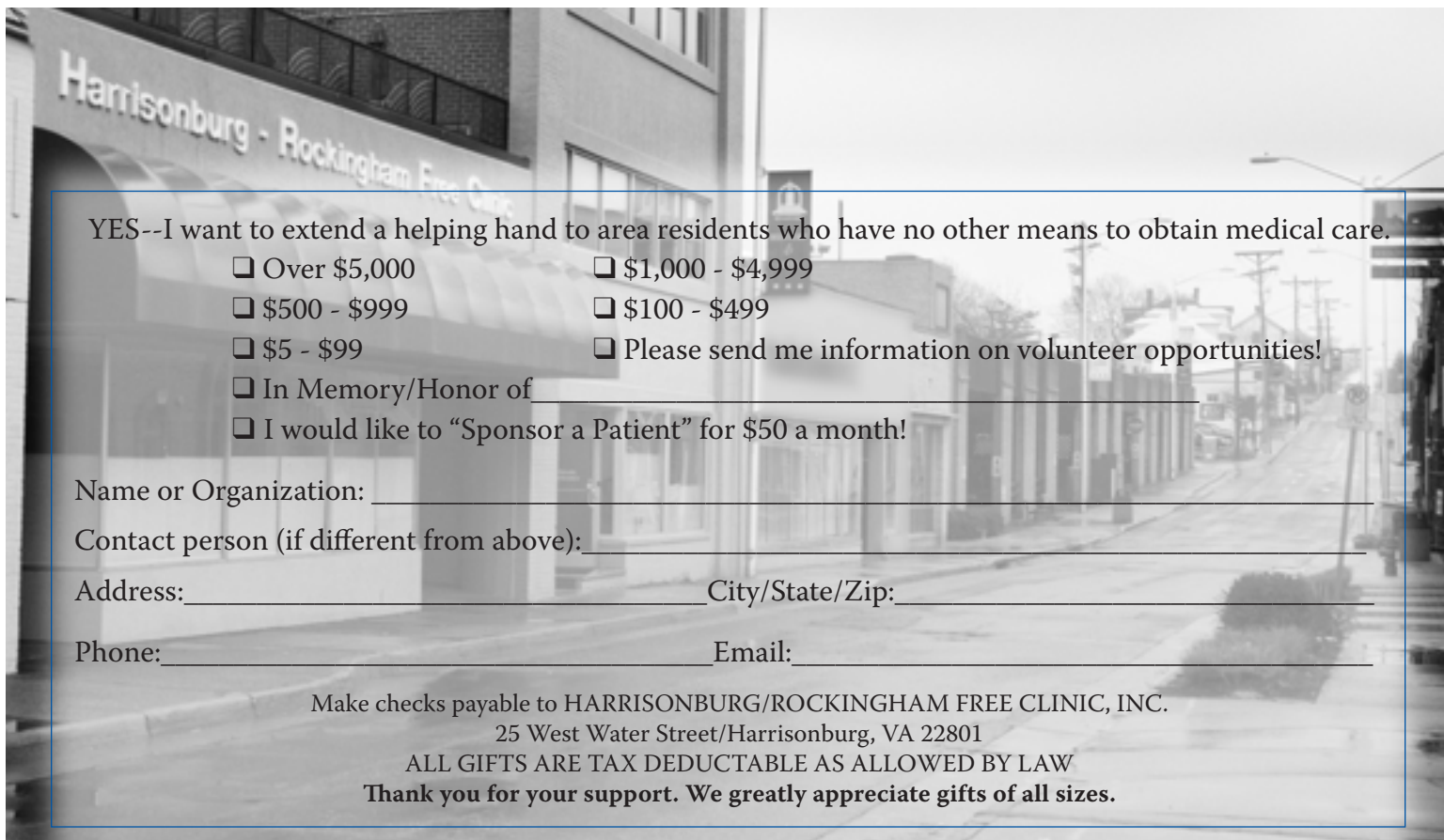
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
